To Start vi

To use on a file, type in vi filename. If the file named filename exists, then the first page(or screen) of the file will be displayed: if the file does not exist, then an empty file and screen are created into which you may enter text.

vi	-r filename	Recover filename that was being edited when system crashed

To Exit vi

Usually the new or modified file is saved when you leave vi. However, it is also possible to quit vi without saving the file.

Note: The cursor moves to bottom of screen whenever a colon (:) is typed. This type of command is completed by hitting the <return> (or <Enter>) key.

*	:x <return></return>	Quit vi, writing out modified file to file named in original invocation
	:wq <return></return>	Quit vi, writing out modified file to file named in original invocation
	:q <return></return>	Quit (or exit) vi
*	:q! <return></return>	Quit vi, even though latest changes have not been saved for this vi call

*	а	Append text after cursor, until <esc> hit</esc>
	А	Append text to end of current line, until <esc> hit</esc>

*	0	Open and put text in a new line above current line, until <esc> hit</esc>
