PART - A

THE PLAN OF ACTION CHALKED OUT BY THE IQAC TOWARDS QUALITY ENHANCEMENT AND THE OUTCOME ACHIEVED

i) Plan of Action: Initiation of academic reforms.

- 1. Taking lead from the past experience, University planned to bring some reforms like initiating changes in the curriculum to keep pace with the latest developments in the concerned subjects of the particular Department, improve the infrastructure facilities in different Departments, increase collaboration with educational and research institutions in India and abroad and improve the quality of research.
- 2. University plan of action mainly involved making education accessible to the rural population of the area, for which the University already has distinct recognition. Different Departments have introduced pertinent changes to improve the quality of teaching. Some of the changes which were introduced in the previous sessions like increasing the percentage of marks for internal assessment from 20% to 30% are continuing.
- 3. Most of the Departments recognized the need to introduce topics of current relevance and the same have been incorporated in the syllabus.
- 4. Many Departments have introduced weekly quizzes as part of the curriculum and other Departments are following in.
- 5. Students are given the freedom to select the subjects that they find particularly interesting to them and/or which can help them acquire broad perception about the subject which can improve their employability. Slowly students are realizing the relevance of the CBCS (Choice Based Credit System) and more and more students are opting for subjects out of their parent Department.
- 6. Most of the Departments are using IT facilities provided in the University to make classroom teaching more effective. All the Departments have internet connectivity with high speed broadband and the classrooms are equipped with LCD projector enabling multimedia presentation in the classroom.
- 7. New research avenues have been opened by introducing M. Phil. and Ph.D. courses in important areas like women studies.

- 8. Some of the Departments have celebrated Golden Jubilee functions to commemorate the achievements of the Departments and bestow the legends of the Departments their due recognition during the functions.
- 9. Besides addition of the latest books related to both teaching and research in the main library almost all the Departments have improved Departmental libraries utilizing the grant from the University or from special assistances received from funding agencies like UGC, DST etc.
- 10. All the Departments have attempted to improve the infrastructure facilities for both teaching and research.
- 11. Engineering Departments have made significant strides in introducing and improving need based research as an important component of the curriculum, the same is extended for the common benefit of the society.
- 12. Several Departments are collaborating with educational and research institutions both in India and from abroad, to improve the research activities. This introduces the scholars to new and upcoming fields of research. The results of these activities are reflected in improvement in the ranking of the University in research at the national level and other kind of recognitions like sanction of PURSE scheme to the University.
- 13. There are many ways an educational institution can serve the society. The community services extended by various Departments to the different sections of society is part of that different Department have come up with new approaches for community service like;
 - Educating people about the usage of medicinal plants through exhibition of medicinal plants.
 - Providing guidance to the aqua-farmers about various techniques to improve the output of aqua-farms, educate them about various diseases related to fisheries and how to cope up with them.
 - Spreading environmental awareness through meetings in villages and participating in the plantation programmes.
 - The rural population needs to be educated about the health of women, our faculty members are educating the rural population about the importance of women health and also providing diet counseling to rural children and adult.
 - Faculty members are extending their expertise to industries in the area of statistical quality control.
 - Students are actively involved in pulse programme and blood donation camps. They are also in the forefront to educate the rural population about AIDS.

21. IMPROVEMENTS IN LIBRARY SERVICE OF THE DEPARTMENT (IF ANY)

- The central library of the University is a house (1,42,100) for more than 3.5 lakh books related to various subjects. Prof. C. Arunaprasad Reddy is the Librarian of S.V. University Library. In his able guidance the library serves to the needs of students, scholars and faculty members of the University.
- Besides the members of University students from other Universities and colleges also make use of the vast resources of the library. The library is constantly developing keeping pace with the latest developments in the technology. Digital library is one of the busiest sections of the library where students and scholars spend time searching for the research publications of their interest. About 9,778 readers are registered as members of the University Library.
- One lakh forty two thousand and one hundred readers visited the Library between 01-07-2009 to 30-6-2010, and 36,500 documents were issued to different categories of users. About 2,807 documents were purchased, and 474 back volumes of journals added to the existing collection enhancing the total stock of the Library Collection to 3,50,510 documents. About 4,910 documents were classified and catalogued.
- The University Library has subscribed to about 379 Indian Journals in different subject fields.
- About 1,768 members belonging to other Universities and Research Institutions visited the Library during the report period to collect information for their Research/Project work.
- About 1,200 damaged books and 150 damaged Thesis/M. Phil Dissertations were bounded and repaired by the staff of the Binding Section during the report period.
- An amount of Rs.47,918/- was collected towards the loss of books, loss of tickets, overdue charges and security deposit and annual fee from Deposit Borrowers.
- About 28,900 readers utilized the material available in Competitive Examination Cell of SVU Library for preparing to various competitive examinations.

25. COMPUTERIZATION OF ADMINISTRATION AND THE PROCESS OF ADMISSIONS AND EXAMINATION RESULTS, ISSUE OF CERTIFICATES:

- During 2010, as per the direction of the AP State Council of Higher Education, SVU Region Common entrance tests and admissions were taken up by Directorate of Admissions, S.V. University. Prof. K. Janardhanam as Convener and conducted SVU Region Common Entrance Tests (SVURPGCET) in June 2010 for making admissions into post graduate courses in University's constituent colleges, and affiliated colleges of Sri Venkateswara University, Sri Krishanadevaraya University, Sri Padmavathi Mahila Visvavidyalayam, Yogi Vemana University, Vikrama Simhapuri University and Rayalaseema University.
- Counseling for admission was done during July-August 2010 with local networking facility at Srinivasa Auditorium. A total of 9,931 students were admitted into various PG courses of six Universities for the academic year 2010-11.
- Admissions into M. Phil./Ph.D. Programmes in different disciplines of the University as well as affiliated colleges and National research institutes were done during 2010.
- Students were admitted to sponsored seats in M. Tech. courses in SVU College of Engineering and M. Pharmacy course in SV University College of Sciences.
- Admissions were also made for 5 Year Integrated Course in Physics in SVU Colleges of sciences, and Diploma Course in Epigraphy and Certificate course in Music in SVU College of Arts.
- Computerized consolidated mark list and provisional certificates have been issued to UG and PG students
- DDE Applications are made available on SVU website for download
- SVURPGCET Results were made available on SVU website.
- The students were given the opportunity to change the options at II counseling.
- Computerizing the admission procedure in the University is continuing to streamline the working and make the process more transparent and quick. The following table gives the detail of the new additions in the process.

32. HEALTH SERVICES:

- Sri Venkateswara University Health Centre was established in the year 1962 with one Medical Officer and a half-dozen supporting staff primarily to serve the student community. Gradually the services of the Health Centre have been extended to employees and their dependant family members and retired employees and their spouses.
- Now the Health Centre covers a population of about 20,000. On average about 300 patients visit the Health Centre daily for various health problems. In proportion to gradual increase in work load additional staff have been added to the Health Centre periodically. The Health Centre renders out-patient treatment as well as In-patient treatment with bed strength of 12. Now the Health Centre has 25 staff members serving for the health of the University staff and students.
- In addition to the above regular staff the Health Centre has the benefit of the services of five senior most consultant specialists in the specialties of 1) General Medicine 2) General Surgery 3) Ophthalmology 4) Dental Surgery and 5) Radiology drawn from S.V.R.R. Government General Teaching Hospital, Tirupati.
- Keeping pace with the modern development in the medical services the Health Centre now has the following equipment.

1. DIRECTORATE OF ADMISSIONS, SV UNIVERSITY, TIRUPATI

- Prof. K. Janardhanam is the director of the Directorate of Admissions in the University.
- During 2010, as per the direction of the AP State Council of Higher Education, SVU
 Region Common entrance tests and admissions were taken up by S.V. University.
- Directorate of Admissions, S.V. University with Prof. K. Janardhanam as Convener conducted SVU Region Common Entrance Tests (SVURPGCET) in June 2010 for making admissions into post graduate courses in University constituent's colleges, and

- affiliated colleges of Sri Venkateswara University, Sri Krishanadevaraya University, Sri Padmavathi Mahila Visvavidyalayam, Yogi Vemana University, Vikrama Simhapuri University and Rayalaseema University.
- Counseling for admission was done during July-August 2010 with local networking facility at Srinivasa Auditorium. A total of 9931 students were admitted into various PG courses of six Universities for the academic year 2010-11.
- Admissions into M. Phil./Ph.D. Programmes in different disciplines of the University as well as affiliated colleges and National research institutes were done during 2010.
- Admissions were done into sponsored seats of M. Tech. courses in SVU College of Engineering and M. Pharmacy course in SV University College of Sciences.
- Admissions were also made for 5 Year Integrated Course in Physics in SVU Colleges of sciences, and Diploma Course in Epigraphy and Certificate course in Music in SVU College of Arts.

2. NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME BUREAU

- National Service Scheme (NSS) is a community service programme sponsored by the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports, Govt., of India. Mahatma Gandhi, the Father of Nation had recognized that the country could not progress in desired direction, until the students youth were motivated to work for upliftment of the village community. Basing on the motive of Mahatma Gandhi, the Govt., of India had launched the National Service Scheme (NSS) on 24th September, 1969 i.e., the birth Centenary Year of Mahatma Gandhi.
- The main aim of National Service Scheme is to involve the student youth in community service, while they are studying in Educational institutions, as the educated youth are expected to take the reins of administration in future.
- Following are the main objectives of NSS
- o To understand the community in which they work.
- To identify the needs and problems of the community and involve them in problem solving process.
- o To develop among themselves a sense of social civic responsibility.
- o To acquire leadership qualities and democratic attitude.

- o To practice National Integration and social harmony.
- o To develop capacity to meet emergencies and natural disasters.
- To utilize their knowledge in innovating practical solution to individual and community problems.
- Although the allotted strength for NSS is 39,600 a total of 417,50 volunteers enrolled for NSS during the period 2009-10, out of which 31,900 were male and 9,850 were female

- There are many regular and extra curricular activities in school in which almost all the students are participating actively, like regular visits to regional science centre for conducting experiments, observing demos and participating home quiz competitions. 5. S.V.U. LABORATORY NURSERY SCHOOL

S.V.U. Laboratory Nursery School was established in the year 1962 attached to the department of Home Science, as a teaching laboratory for the Child Development/ Human Development branch students. Pre - school children (Above 3 years and Below 6 years) of the employees of S.V. University and residents of Tirupati town belonging to all strata of Population are admitted into the school. The method of teaching for young children in through play way and Montessori Method of education. The Pre- school education programme has been supported with competent and trained teaching and non-teaching staff and age appropriate and attractive indoor and outdoor equipment and with constrict monitoring by the staff of Human Development branch and Head, Home Science Department.

As the department of Home Science has team of specialist in Food Science and nutrition, a nutritious snack is prepared under their supervision and is served for the students during mid morning sessions meeting one-fourth requirements of their daily nutrition needs.

Discouragement of 3 R's teaching (Reading writing and arithmetic), encouraging children to learn by doing, First hand experience through filed trips students ecursions and parent education thorough special lectures by child development specialists in PTA meeting are some of the special features of the lab nursery school making it an unique school in Tirupati town.

6. DAY - CARE CENTRE

Day care centre was started in the year 2005 under UGC XI plan merged scheme for the employees of S.V. University and also to cater to the needs of children whose parents are employed and who need to be taken care during day time. The Day – Care Centre is located in the premise of S.V.U. Laboratory Nursery School with sufficient Indoor and Outdoor space and equipment along with colorful and attractive non-toxic toys and area for rest. The center functions from 9.00 AM to 5.00 PM on all working days.

7. DIRECTORATE OF STUDENT WELFARE AND CULTURAL AFFAIRS

- Established in the year 1995, Directorate of Student Welfare and Cultural Affairs, endeavors to promote cultural, national and communal integration in the campus. Presently Prof. B.V.Muralidhar is providing his services as Director and the services of the Co-Ordinator are extended by Sri K.M. Bhanu.
- The Directorate provides an avenue for the expression of literary and artistic creativity and originality among the students, research scholars and faculty.
- It aims to inculcate discipline, enhance commitment, develop service motto among the students, and to pro-actively identify and redress the grievances of the students, besides taking care of the developmental, informational and welfare needs of the students in the campus.
- The Directorate undertakes the following activities:

8. ENTRY INTO SERVICES FOR SC/ST AND MINORITY COMMUNITIES

The training centre is arranging special classes to the students who are writing competitive examinations. Classes has been taken in general subjects basically arts and sciences including Reasoning, General knowledge etc. Students have been trained batch wise. Coaching has been giving to Group – II, Bank – IBPS, Ten members were qualified in TET in this year.

9. SC / ST SPECIAL CELL

- The Special Cell (SC / ST) was established during the year 1983-84 with the Financial Assistance of the University Grants Commission, New Delhi for monitoring the implementation the Rule of Reservation policy for SC/ST in the Universities and Colleges to collect data regarding the implementation of the Policies in respect of admissions, appointments to Teaching and Non-Teaching positions in the University.
- Prof. R. Abbaiah, Department of Statistics, S.V. U. College of Sciences, Tirupati is providing
 his valuable services as Liaison Officer for SC/ST Special Cell w.e.f 31-10-2009. Prof. K.
 Munirathnam, Department of Telugu Studies, SVU College of Arts, Tirupati is working as
 Special Officer for SC/ST Cell.
- The Cell performs the following functions:
 - 1. To circulate the Government of India and Commission's decisions to the concerned and to collect regular, information regarding the course wise admissions to candidates belonging to the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes in the Universities and Colleges, as and when required by the Govt...
 - 2. To circulate the Government of India orders and Commission's decisions and to collect information in respect of appointment, training of these communities in teaching and non-teaching posts in the Universities and Colleges
 - 3. To collect reports and information regarding the Government of India orders on the various aspects of education, training and employment of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribe candidates, for evolving new policies or modifying existing policy.
 - 4. To analyses the information so collected and to prepare reports and digests for onward transmission to the Ministry of Human Resource Development/University Grants Commission and such other authorities as may be required.
 - 5. To monitor the working of the remedial coaching scheme, if approved in the affiliated colleges and university.
 - 6. To function as a Grievances Redressal Cell for the grievances of SC/ST students and employees of the university and render them the necessary help in solving their academic as well as administrative problems.
 - 7. The Special Cell is also monitoring the Self Supporting Courses which are being offered in about 28 subjects at S.V.U. Colleges, Tirupati and 7 subjects at S.V.U.P.G. Centre, Kavali
 - 8. Any other work assigned by the Govt. from time to time to promote higher education among these two communities suffering from economic, social and educational deprivations for implementation.

10. SEXUAL HARASSMENT CELL

To take care of sexual harassment on women students SVU arranged special cell. Senior women faculty member Prof. Y. Yellamma, Dept. of Zoology has been appointed as Co-ordinator to take care of the women students.

11. ANTI – RAGGING COMMITTEE

Prof. C. Subbarami Reddy, Principal, SVU College of Sciences was appointed as Chairman to Anti-Ragging Committee and members are faculty of all departments and wardens of Men and Women Hostels and Senior students of all departments.

- The committee has been monitoring the students activities continuously from early hours to late nights.
- The Chairman and concerned members of committee visited each and every department and enlightened the students regarding the punishment if they indulge in ragging.
- Flexi boards were arranged in all buildings near class rooms indicating the consequences of ragging.
- Surprise visits to hostels at late nights and in the campus in day times to avoid ragging.
- Classes on Anti-ragging have been arranged every year in SVU auditorium and counseling has been given to students by the officials of S.V. University and Police Department.

II. Remarks and suggestions made by the NAAC peer team, action taken and progress achieved by the university.

NAAC Peer Team visited the University from 16th February to 18th February, 2009. It has given comprehensive analysis of the academic and administrative landscape of the University with direction for future activities. The University was reaccredited with 'A' grade on 8th March 2009 by National Assessment and Accreditation Council. The Peer team appreciated the efforts of the University staff in various spheres under the able guidance the Vice-Chancellor, like academics, research and administration. The three major features in the Institution as perceived by the Peer Team during the accreditation process are;

- The University caters to students mostly from rural and socially disadvantaged sections.
- Commitment of the staff and University authorities to student development.
- Good stakeholder relationship with alumni and other stakeholders provides financial and academic support to the University.

The team has suggested some areas where improvement could help the Institution in realizing its goal for becoming an Institute of Excellence. The entire University staff took the recommendation positively and moved steadfast to make improvements in the areas suggested by the NAAC Peer Team. Given below are the recommendations of the Peer team and the steps taken by the University for Improvement in the very next academic year.

1. Administration and Financial management needs an overhaul.

Steps taken for improvement:

A decentralization drive was initiated. The University administration appointed Deans, Special Officers, and Coordinators to monitor various academic, administrative, research, student welfare and extension activities.

For the first time a corpus fund was created to meet unprecedented expenditure in the future.

In pursuit of e-governance, intranet and internet connectivity was installed and extended.

2. Departments offering similar courses should be clubbed for optimal utilization of resources such as Economics and Econometrics, Education and IASE etc.

Steps taken for improvement:

Some of the Departments are offering additional/self supporting courses for which the infrastructure facilities of the parent Department are utilized and new resources are generated as and when possible.

3. Language laboratory for use by all the language Departments needs to be established and students should be provided intensive courses in communication skills.

Steps taken for improvement:

A language laboratory will be established in the Department of English for which a grant of Rs. 50, 00,000/- has been allotted by the University.

4. Courses be taught by qualified staff in respective disciplines (for example presently the Pharmacy course is taught by Biochemists. Similarly Biotechnology, Biomedical engineering etc. are taught by faculty from Zoology.

Steps taken for improvement:

New faculties were recruited in different disciplines to improve the quality of teaching, e.g. in Biotechnology, Future Studies, Botany, Mathematics, Chemistry, Women studies.

5. Placement cell should be more effective

Steps taken for improvement:

A Career Awareness and Recruitment Drive (CAED) in the University Campus was organized in collaboration with A.P. State Council for Higher Education to motivate the students to get themselves prepared for competitive exams and other selections, besides providing the required information on placement opportunities. Resource Persons were drawn from University, Industries, R and D Organizations and five programmes on Career Awareness and Counseling have been organized for the PG final year students of Life Sciences, Arts, Physical Sciences and Commerce, Management and Information Sciences. A coordinator was appointed to organize all these programmes successfully.

 A total of 233 students got placement during these programmes in the academic year 2007-08. • The continued dedication and efforts of University have helped 316 students in getting quality placement in the next academic year i.e. 2008-09.

Online counseling centre was established at SVU campus, in collaboration with APSCHE, Hyderabad. This centre will facilitate enormous saving of time and money and avoid possible inconvenience to students and parents of drought prone areas of Rayalseema from going to different places for selection/interviews in connection with various Common Entrance Examinations conducted by Government of Andhra Pradesh.

6. Infrastructural facilities such as hostel, canteen, internal roads, health care centre etc. for campus at Kavali and similarly hostel facilities in terms of room occupancy should be congenial to the requirement of PG and Research students. Facilities such as internet should be provided in the hostel also.

Steps taken for improvement:

Hostel facilities were improved to provide congenial atmosphere to the students, and construction work for new ones is under progress. Some of the facilities newly added are;

- Construction of Golden Jubilee hostel for Women in 2nd premises in SVUC, Tirupati, completed. Rs.160 lakhs were provided by the state government for this work.
- Construction of Men's hostel for SVU college of Arts and Science was completed with a cost of Rs. 100 lakhs. Both the University and UGC funds were utilized for the construction.
- Hostel for Engineering College was constructed with a cost of Rs. 100 lakhs, using the financial resources of University and UGC.
- Hostel for physically challenged students of SVUC, Tirupati was constructed with a cost of Rs. 80 lakhs. Sponsors have provided the funding for this work.
- An approach road in MBA building was constructed with expenditure of Rs. 9.90 lakhs. UGC provided the financial assistance for this work.
- An internet pub adjacent to D Block Men's hostel in SVU campus was constructed. It costed Rs. 6.5 lakhs for which financial sources of University were explored.
- Cement concrete road was laid down in front of Vamana Rao Bhavan in SVU campus, Tirupati, with cost of Rs. 2.25 lakh, for which the funding was provided by the state government.
- A check dam was constructed across stream near Prakasam Nagar quarters in SVUC, Tirupati, with TTD funds amounting to Rs. 2.20 lakhs.
- Rs. 1.80 lakhs from University sources were spent on laying of cement concrete for the faculty club approach road.
- Construction is under progress for the following works;

Construction of cement concrete basketball court in SVUCE in SVUC, Tirupati, is under progress and the estimated cost is Rs. 7.50 lakhs. Financial resources of University are being utilized for this construction.

Corner rooms and adjacent rooms into bath room's toilet facilities for physically challenged students in Men's hostel are being renovated. This work will cost Rs. 4.08 lakhs, and the funds from UGC are being used for this construction.

7. Drinking water facility, sanitation and maintenance should be improved specifically in the men's hostel.

Steps taken for improvement:

Pure drinking water facilities are provided in all the Departments of University and different hostels, under the supervision of the Principles of the concerned colleges. They have been taking care of the maintenance of the installed units also.

8. ICT component needs to be integrated in to all sections and unites of the University by proper networking particularly in admission, financial and examination.

Steps taken for improvement:

All sections of the administration are provided with sufficient numbers of computers. The internet connectivity has been established and initiation towards e-governance is in progress.

Single point data entry system is introduced for payment of salaries to the employees of University. This has facilitated on-line credit of salaries into the individual bank accounts of the employees.

- Department of Admissions is now 100% computerized.
- For state level admissions online counseling is provided.
- Both UG and PG examination procedures are 100% computerized.
- Internet band width was enhanced from 2 MBPS to 4 MBPS from 17th August 2009. It
- was further increased to 1GBPS w.e.f. 13th March 2010.
- SV University website is updated regularly by the computer centre to provide the details of activities in University on almost real time basis.

Conversion of Examination processing from COBOL based platform to Visual Basic is under process and will be changed soon.

Software required to process and publish the results of all the courses in the University will be completed soon.

Software is being developed to for preparing payroll of SV University Employees.

9. The facilities of the University press needs modernization.

Steps taken for improvement:

Facilities in University press were improved by procuring the new machines. The latest additions to the University press are;

- Wire stitching machine costing Rs. 4,55,875/-
- Auto Print 1520 Mini Offset printing machine costing Rs. 4,89,700/-
- Single Colour Sheet fed Offset Printing machine (FAIR PRINT) costing Rs. 5,58,369/-
- Toshiba Xerox machine costing Rs. 51,700/-
- DV PLO DP machine costing Rs. 6,96,537/-
- 10. The horticulture unit needs to be strengthened and plantation be increased, water recycling, water harvesting and biodegradation and bio waste management should be introduced.

Steps taken for improvement:

Horticulture Unit has completed Landscaping work in front of A.D. building. Garden development was completed at many places in the campus;

- Entrance of Computer centre
- Entrance of Indo China building
- North side of Ladies hostel
- Main entrance of A.D. building at Golden Jubilee Gate
- Front of Engineering College and inside of the college separate gardens were developed
- Southern side of Physical Sciences block
- Front area of Central Library
- 11. Under graduate examination process should be reviewed and improved including computerization.

Steps taken for improvement:

Some new practices were introduced in the academic year 2007-08, this was done keeping in mind the examination pattern of various competitive exams and proper evaluation of students' performance.

A new design was given for answer script which contains 30 pages as a single book and the earlier method of attaching additional sheets to the main answer book is dispensed with. This has facilitated the students in properly utilizing the pages provided, thereby making the students write brief and informative contents only. Besides this the practice is helpful for students preparing for various competitive exams like NET, where they are required to write the answers in a limited space.

Student's assessment is through internal evaluation, Seminars, Study tours, Quizzes and semester end exams.

Internal test was reintroduced but restricted to one test of one hour duration. Valuation of semester end examination both internal and external. It was made more transparent.

To improve the performance of slow learners, diagnostic tests and remedial measures were taken wherever it was felt necessary.

To ensure fair-conduct of examinations in the affiliated colleges the University has embarked on the jumbling system under which students of a particular affiliated college would be allotted to different centers of examinations in other affiliate colleges. The University has the practice of double valuation for PG courses, moderation, revaluation, re-totaling and personal identification.

12. Though the university introduced Choice Based Credit System the importance of going beyond the Department and choosing credits from a range of subjects is lacking. Thus proper orientation of both the students and staff to move in the direction of optimization of CBCS should be looked at.

Steps taken for improvement:

- From the 2007-08 Academic year, courses like Workshop, Engineering, Graphics, Computer Programming, Basic Sciences, Mechanical and Electrical Technology, Data Structures, Language Laboratory, are offered by the Department of Civil Engineering. Students of Departments of Mechanical Engineering, Computer Science and Civil Engineering are opting for these courses.
- Department of Zoology and SVU PG centre, Kavali are offering the Bioinformatics course and students of Zoology and MCA are opting for parts of this course.
- 13. Special attention needs to be given at Kavali campus to make it more integrated with main campus.

Steps taken for improvement:

Microbiology Department of PG centre Kigali has recently shifted to Sri Venkateswara University main campus.

14. Academic autonomy and also certain financial autonomy be given to Departments, constituent colleges and Kavali campus.

Steps taken for improvement:

Attempts were made to make the administration more transparent. Some of the initiatives taken are:

- Empowerment of the Principals of all the constituent colleges in utilization of funds for improving the infrastructure and amenities worth up to Rs. 1.00 lakh, as well as for according permission to the proposals of Faculty.
- Delegation of powers to the local purchase committee up to Rs. 1.00 lakh to overcome the time delay owing to procedural wrangles.
- After getting the 'A' grade the University staff felt rejuvenated, Sri Venkateswara University has moved ahead with firm determination and defined mission ever since.

- Vice-chancellor has given personal attention to the various academic, research and administrative activities. The University has already got some of the recognition which was due, by all the efforts.
- The University has been ranked 19th among the top 25 Universities in India, in research performance both in quality and number of publications.
- The university ranks 6th in top 10 Universities in the area of Energy Research.
- University was selected for DST-PURSE programme and received a grant of Rs. 9.00 Crores.
